INTRO UP AND UNDER

Hi, everybody. Even the stoutest advocate of nuclear power will agree that peaceful uses of the atom have also developed problems for society to solve. One of them is safe disposal of radioactive waste. Nuclear power plants use relatively large amounts of unanium to develop the heat needed to make electricity. But other places generate low-level waste, including hospitals, industries and even schools. This waste cannot be used up during a normal lifetime, and it cannot be left where people can come in contact with it. What to do? New York State has a new law that outlines a solution over the next few months, and years, you'll be hearing a lot about this.

Today, I'll be talking with Dr. Sheldon Reaven. He is fresh from chairing a conference on this subject at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he is a professor in the Department of Technology and Society. Dr. Reaven, New York isn't going to have an easy time of it, finding a site for disposing of its low-level radioactive waste, is it.
