Could This Happen to Long Island? Two United Nations ambassadors from the Maldives and Papua New Guinea – nations immediately threatened by global climate change – will discuss "Islands and Sea Level Rise" as part of the Dean's Distinguished Lecture Series at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 8, in Stony Brook Southampton's Duke Lecture Hall. The event will be hosted by Stony Brook Southampton Dean and Vice President Mary Pearl. Ambassadors Abdul Ghafoor Mohamed and Robert Aisi, UN representatives from the Maldives and Papua New Guinea, respectively, will address how global temperature change will result a very real threat to the Maldives and part of PNG being totally submerged in the next six years. The islands of Carteret, a part of PNG, are facing complete inundation by 2015, it is estimated, and the government is conducting a phased evacuation. Carteret evacuees are being called the first environmental refugees. Is what's happening to their islands a harbinger for Long Island? In the Carterets, sea levels are rising at a phenomenal rate and sea walls have vanished under the tide. Fallen trees are strewn along beaches, their roots eroded. The sea levels have made it impossible for islanders to grow anything but coconuts, and they rely on aid from the capitol. The government is relocating people, but many residents refuse to move, instead saying they will die with their island. For further information about the lecture, call 631-632-5028.
