University Joins Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration

Student groups and campus organizations have come together to organize Hispanic Heritage Month—the first month-long celebration of the cultural richness of the university's Hispanic community. Events featuring Hispanic culture through film, music, art and food are planned.

The term "Hispanic" refers to a variety of related but different cultures, and throughout the month of October, opportunities are available to sample the ethnic diversity of the university's Hispanic community.

On Thursday, Oct. 18, a Hispanic crafts and food fair will be held from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Stony Brook Union Fireside Lounge. Traditional Hispanic crafts will be displayed and may be purchased. Samples of traditional Hispanic food will also be served.

At noon, Jose Montaña, a 34-year-old Bolivian musician who specializes in the music of Aymara Indians, will present an Aymara Indian music concert in the Stony Brook Union Art Gallery. Montaña is currently touring the United States with *Grupo Aymara*.

Later that afternoon, *Amanecer Boliviano*, a 16-member dance troupe, will perform traditional Andean music and dance from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. in the Stony Brook Union. *Amanecer Boliviano* has performed at festivals around the world for the past 10 years. Joining them will be *Grupo Los Andes* to perform music on traditional string, wind and percussion instruments.

Several other events are planned during the month including an exhibition and sale of Bolivian art, Oct. 15-25 in the Stony Brook Union Gallery. Also, the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Ellen Leitchman will present a lecture on

the musical roots of Hispanic Andean traditions Wednesday, Oct. 24 in Room 2322 of the Staller Center for the Arts.

Symphony Performs Chinese and Western Music

The Shanghai Symphony Orchestra, the oldest professional organization of its kind in China, presents its distinctive style of music Saturday, Oct. 20 at 8:00 p.m. at the Staller Center for the Arts.

Under the baton of conductor Hou Run-Yu, the orchestra will present Berlioz's *The Roman Carnival Overture*, Op. 9, Rachmaninoff's *Symphony No. 2* in E minor, and Chen Gang's concerto for erhu and orchestra, *The Butterfly Lovers*.

The Butterfly Lovers will feature soloist Jiang Jian-Hua on the erhu, a traditional Chinese two-stringed, bowed instrument. Jiang Jian-Hua studied folk music at China's Central Music University, where she subsequently taught. She has toured Europe, Japan, the Middle East and the United States. She currently studies composition at Tokyo's Toho Gakuen School of Music.

Founded in 1879, the Shanghai Symphony originally had no Chinese members in the ensemble, although some made guest appearances. In 1938 that policy changed when three Chinese musicians joined the group.

During the 1949 establishment of the People's Republic of China, foreign musicians began to leave Shanghai and by 1955, the orchestra was composed exclusively of Chi-

nese musicians. Since that time, the orchestra has grown to nearly 100 members and three resident conductors. Its repertoire encompasses the music of every nation, period and style.

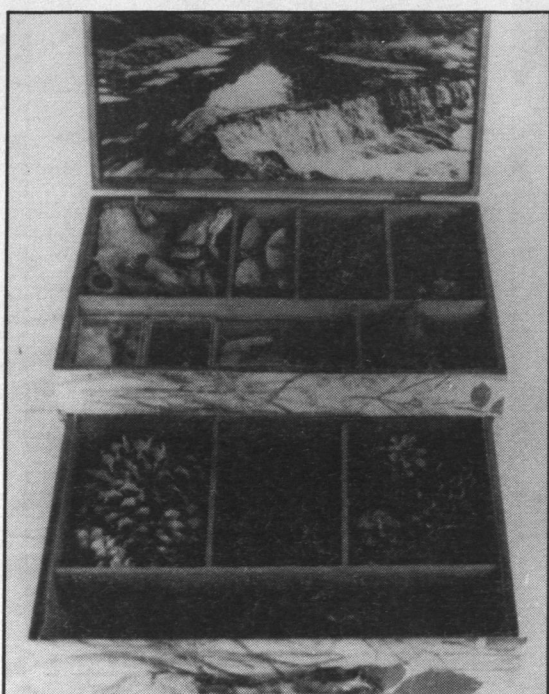

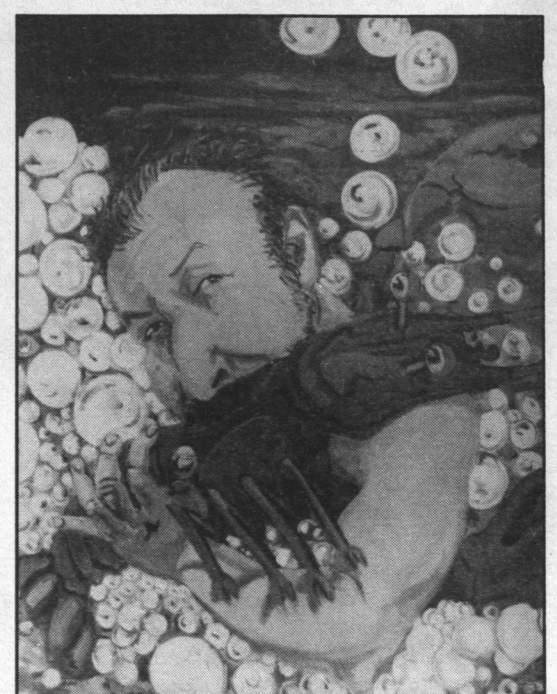
