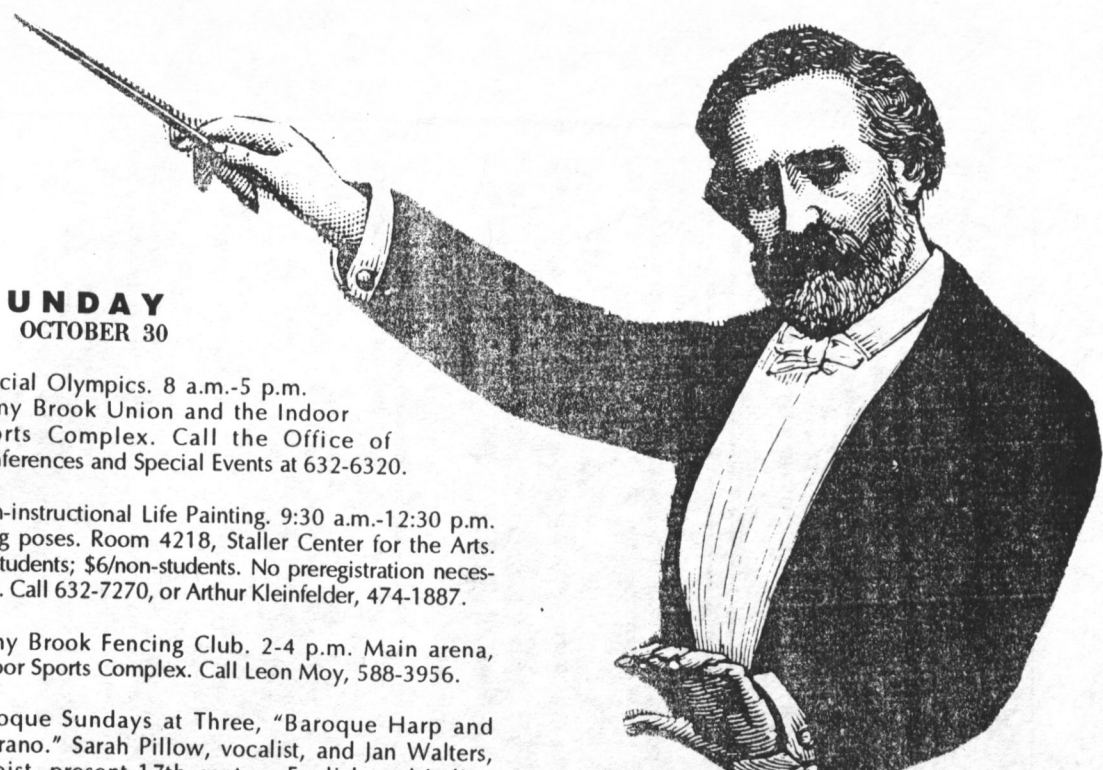

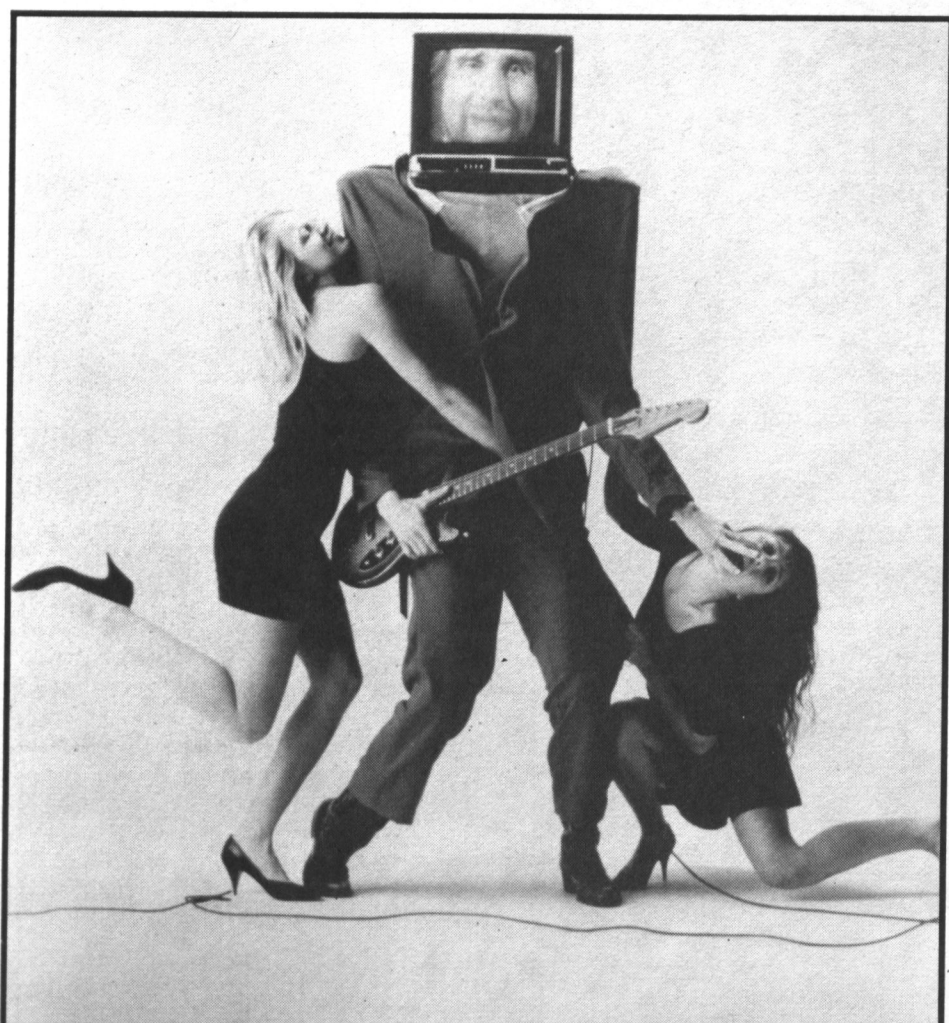

The British operetta centers on outrageous plot complications: babies exchanged in the cradle, eloping lovers, a captain humiliated for using the "D—" word, and lots more. Director Richard Sheldon, faithful to the G&S tradition, presents the show in all its satiric glory.

What impact do Italian Americans have on American culture? What is the relationship between the Catholic Church and the Italian American community? Can people be taught to look beyond stereotypes? The University at Stony Brook's Center for Italian Studies will address these and related questions at an upcoming symposium, "Italian American Studies Programs and Organizations: Interface with the Community."

Open to the public and free of charge, the symposium will be held on Friday, October 28, 2 p.m.-6 p.m. and Saturday, October 29, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. in

the Alliance Room of the Frank Melville, Jr. Memorial Library. Meals will be available in the University Club by advance reservation (Lunch: \$10; Dinner: \$15).

Keynote speaker will be Frederic Salerno, chair of the SUNY Board of Trustees and vice chair of the NYNEX Board of Directors. Faculty members from Stony Brook, Adelphi, St. John's, Purdue, the University of Rhode Island, the University of Indiana (Bloomington) and other schools will lead sessions. Also participating will be Sylvana Mangione of the Office of the General Counsel for Italians Abroad, a division of Italy's Ministry of Foreign Affairs; Robert Viscusi, executive director of the Italian American Writers' Association; Lydio Tomasi, director of the Center for Migration Studies; Raymond Pacia, founder of the Rhode Island chapter of the National Italian American Bar Association; writers, editors, scholars, and more.

Sessions will assess the real image of ethnic and cultural studies, consider the interactions between universities and civic organizations, and set goals for the future.

"This play raises issues that need attention," says

Farley Richmond, chair of the Department of Theatre Arts. That's why he is directing a production of *The Diary of Anne Frank*, which will be performed in the Staller Center for the Arts, Theatre II, November 3-6 and 10-13. Performances Thursday through Saturday are at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m.

The Pulitzer Prize-winning drama by Frances Goodrich and Albert Harris, based on the personal diary of a teenage Jewish girl in hiding from the Nazis during World War II, turns on issues of tolerance and prejudice; loyalty, hope and love. Dr. Richmond cites recent incidents of racism on Long Island, ethnic conflicts in Bosnia and Rwanda, and the film, *Schindler's List*, as further reasons for choosing to present *The Diary of Anne Frank* this year.

In addition, he notes, theatre students are likely to be involved in productions of the play when they leave the university, because it has become a standard in the school and community theatre repertory.

And, perhaps, most important of all, not long ago Dr. Richmond visited the secret annex in Amsterdam where the Franks, the Van Daans, and Mr. Dussel hid out during those fateful years of Anne's life. He recalls that he was "struck by the reality of it," and decided to direct the drama at Stony Brook.
