HOLIDAY MAGIC: Looking for something different in the way of holiday entertainment? Then mark Saturday, December 17 on your calendar! That's the date University at Stony Brook chemistry professor C.V. Krishnan cooks up a breathtaking demonstration of the wonders of chemistry for the young set and adults, too.

The popular "Magic World of Chemistry" program -- now in its ninth year -- features mini-explosions, fire, steam, smoke and an array of fascinating and fun handson activities and laboratory demonstrations that range from creating foam to concocting crazy colors using simple household ingredients.

The event is free and open to the public, 10 a.m. to noon for the activities, 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. for the demonstrations, all in Rooms 402 to 406, Chemistry Building.

HALL OF FAME: That's where University at Stony Brook materials science professor Herbert Herman has landed, compliments of the Thermal Spray Society which named him to its prestigious Hall of Fame ranks.

Dr. Herman heads Stony Brook's Thermal Spray Laboratory, the first and largest university-based thermal spray laboratory in the nation.

DOUBLE HONORS: For the second year in a row, Stony Brook's chapter of Tau Beta Pi, the national engineering honor society, has won the organization's lofty "Greater Interest In Government" grant.

The grant, one of only four awarded nationally, will underwrite the chapter's project, "A Case Study of How Engineering is Portrayed in High Schools on Long Island." Project leader will be senior Paul DePaoli of Westbury, an electrical engineering major who is president of the Stony Brook chapter.

NEW EDITOR, NEW QUARTERLY: University at Stony Brook psychology professor Marvin Goldfried of Manhattan has been named editor -in-chief of a new quarterly, *In Session: Psychotherapy In Practice*, that will debut next April. The journal, which will be published by John Wiley & Sons, will focus on clinical challenges facing today's

mental health professionals.

ROLL UP YOUR SLEEVE: There's still time for campus and community residents to sign up for a December 13 blood drive at the University at Stony Brook. The need for donors is particularly critical at this time of the year, note the blood drive organizers. Hospital patients across Long Island will benefit from the effort.

The donation itself takes about 10 minutes, plus time for refreshments.



WINTER WEATHER INFORMATION LINES LAUNCHED

For students, employees and visitors to the University at Stony Brook, the latest information on class and event cancellations or delays, campus parking and road conditions will be only a telephone call away, thanks to new telephone winter weather emergency lines that went into operation this week.

The new numbers — 516-632-SNOW for the west and south campus and 516-444-SNOW for the university medical center and east campus — will be updated hourly if needed as a storm approaches.

Each line will be able to handle nearly one hundred calls a minute, so that callers should be able to hear the current message without delay.

"We want to get the word out as quickly as possible in the event a snow storm is heading our way," notes Richard Young, director of public safety, whose department is responsible for monitoring storm conditions in the region and locally. "The new telephone system will give everyone up-to-date information on the condition of campus lots and roads plus cancellations and starting delays so that those who drive don't travel unnecessarily." The university has about 12,000 student commuters plus several thousand employees who commute to work by car.

The university also will continue to issue closing/delay information to area radio stations including WUSB (90.1 FM), Stony Brook's campus station, WALK (97.5 FM), WOR (710 AM), and WCBS (880 AM).

Mid-Day Off-Campus Transportation Available

The Department of Parking and Transportation has put its mid-day mini-van runs in full gear, picking up and dropping off faculty, staff and students as well as residents from the greater Three Village community at several off and on-campus sites. The minivans (one eastbound, the other westbound on identical routes) run weekdays from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at 20-minute intervals. The service makes it possible for to shop, eat and do errands at nearby off-campus sites without a car. Off-campus, each van stops in the hamlet of Stony Brook, Rail Road Commons and Setauket Plaza before returning to the University where it loops around the west, south and east campuses. Service begins at 10:30 a.m. at the Administration Building and terminates at 2:20 p.m. at the hospital loop. The cost? Fifty cents per ride or a campus bus pass.

At University Medical Center educates Health Advocates about HIV/AIDS in our community

Long Island has the largest number of people with HIV/AIDS of any suburban area in the United States. Yet, according to community representatives and educators in the field, to a large majority of people on Long Island, HIV and AIDS are topics they rarely discuss or even think about.

This belief that many people here do not see HIV/AIDS as a problem in their communities was reflected in the comments was reflected in a lively discussion between University Medical Center Health Advocates—volunteers from organizations across Long Island—and Dr. Robert O. Hawkins, Jr., Director of the AIDS Education and Resource Center at Stony Brook and members of his staff.

The Health Advocates meeting was held to talk about perceptions of HIV/ AIDS and discuss prevention and education. The Health Advocates said the attitude about AIDS in most of their communities is one of denial. It was summed up in the comments of one: "It's something others get....It's not a problem in suburbia."

But Hawkins and his staff persist—working to educate educators and caregivers on AIDS prevention. His prevention demonstration at the Health Advocates meeting was direct and interactive. He emphasized to his audience that this kind of direct approach is the only way to teach people how not to get AIDS.
