In Memoriam

Dr. Thomas F. Irvine Jr., Professor Emeritus of Mechanical Engineering, passed away suddenly at his home on June 2. Professor Irvine joined Stony Brook in 1961 as the first Dean of Engineering, serving in that position for 11 years before returning to full-time teaching and research.

Professor Irvine's research interest was in the field of heat transfer. He published more than 100 refereed papers, numerous conference articles, edited several professional journals, and co-edited two textbook series and many books. Dr. Irvine was a member of the Founding Committee for the International Center for Heat and Mass Transfer and an American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) representative to the Scientific Council of the International Center for Heat and Mass Transfer. He was a fellow of ASME, receiving its prestigious Heat Transfer Memorial Award in 1992.

Undergraduate students ranked him as one of the best teachers in the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences (CEAS). He taught many Ph.D. students who now hold important positions in academia and industry in the United States and abroad. After his retirement from teaching nine years ago, Professor Irvine still came to work every day in his laboratory, mentored junior faculty, and was, until two years ago, the faculty advisor to the Student Chapter of ASME housed in the Department of Mechanical Engineering. His untimely passing is a great loss to his family, friends, students, colleagues, the CEAS, and the entire Stony Brook community.

Biomedical Engineering Nets \$155K Grant

The Department of Biomedical Engineering has received a three-year, \$155,000 grant from the Whitaker Foundation to establish an Industrial Internship Program for graduate students in biomedical engineering. This award was submitted in partnership with the Center for Biotechnology at Stony Brook. The goal of the internship program is to create internships at biomedical engineering and biotechnology companies in New York State for graduate students seeking a master's degree in biomedical engineering.

The Center for Biotechnology will play an active role in coordinating the internship program. The Center will facilitate the participation of New York State companies in the program. The award will enable the Center to expand its already successful internship programs while complementing an overall workforce development strategy that is already underway.

Participants for the first year of the internship program will come primarily from the Department of Biomedical Engineering. Students will start their internships at the end of their first academic year and subsequently receive their master's degree in biomedical engineering within six to 12 months.

HSC Awarded \$850K for Geriatric Center

The Health Sciences Center has been awarded a five-year, \$850,000 government grant to establish the Long Island Geriatric Education Center. The Center, a collaborative effort among the five schools of the HSC, will increase geriatric educational programs for students, faculty, and community practitioners.

The grant was awarded by the Bureau of Health Professions in the Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration. All five HSC schools—Dental Medicine, Health Technology and Management, Medicine, Nursing, and Social Welfare—will be involved in the interdisciplinary program development for geriatrics and gerontology.

"With the aging population of Long Island, it is appropriate and meaningful that Stony Brook is the institution where this center will be developed," said Norman Edelman, Vice President for the Health Sciences Center. "This grant will help allow us to continue our mission of educating and training health care professionals in ways that benefit the community, the state, and the nation."

In the first year, the effort will focus on faculty development and the creation of new programs for students and other trainees. In subsequent years, the Center will integrate community-based faculty, health care professionals, and educators at nursing homes into the new programs.


Firm Donates \$25K for Beautification

Lizzul, who graduated from Stony Brook in 1975 with a B.A. in Economics, said, "Newmark is very impressed with the initiative Stony Brook has taken in continually improving its facilities and grounds."

Women's Lacrosse to Start in 2002

Stony Brook will officially begin its first season of women's lacrosse competition in the 2002-03 academic year. Danie Caro has been named as the first women's lacrosse head coach in SBU history. Women's lacrosse is the first new sport added to the athletic department since the University elevated football to varsity status in 1984. The addition of women's lacrosse will increase the total number of varsity sports offered at Stony Brook to 20.

Caro comes to Stony Brook with more than seven years of coaching experience, the most recent being a two-year stint from 1999-2000 as head women's lacrosse coach at St. Bonaventure University in Olean, New York. At St. Bonaventure, Caro directed the transition of a team from club to Division I varsity status for the second time in her career.

Caro, a 1993 graduate of Colgate University, assumed the position of head coach this past summer and will work the 2001-02 academic year to recruit a team for its inaugural season in the spring of 2003.

This year's festival included a first-time outdoor performance by faculty artists and festival participants at the historic Pollock-Krasner House in East Hampton. The summer music festival, developed by the Department of Music, featured students from across the country as well as from Romania and Puerto Rico.

The festival focused on educating young, talented musicians in the areas of chamber music, theory, historical perspective, the business of music, master classes, and composition. Students competed in live auditions for their place in the festival, which included performances in strings, brass, woodwinds, and percussion, as well as in voice.

The festival opened with a gala chamber music concert by the festival's faculty artists and concluded with a chamber music concert by the festival artists.

Professor Whitehurst Named Assistant Secretary of Education

Rod Paige, U.S. Secretary of Education, swore in Dr. Grover "Russ" Whitehurst, Lead Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychology, as Assistant U.S. Secretary of Education. He is a nationally recognized authority on early childhood education and language development.

In his new position, Whitehurst will serve as Director of the Office of Educational Research and Improvement (OERI), which provides essential support for the improvement of American education by building knowledge about teaching and learning and by helping to stimulate improvements in education policy and practice. OERI supports a wide range of research, development, and dissemination activities and the statistics and assessment programs of the National Center for Education Statistics.

"Russ Whitehurst brings a wealth of experience to our research and improvement office, a part of our department that President Bush has singled out as being essential to our goal of creating a system of schools that leaves no child behind," Secretary Paige said. "His leadership will be invaluable as we seek to produce quality research on teaching and learning and share it with educators and the public."

Whitehurst is the second scientist/administrator with Stony Brook ties chosen to serve in the Bush Administration. Over the summer, Dr. John Marburger, the University's former President and the Director of Brookhaven National Laboratory, was nominated to serve as the President's National Science Advisor.


"We at Stony Brook are so very proud of Russ Whitehurst," said President Kenny. "He is a shining example of how our extraordinary faculty not only teach, but also benefit the community, the region, and the nation with their scholarship and commitment."

President Bush formally nominated Whitehurst on April 30, and the Senate confirmed the nomination on July 12.

Whitehurst has conducted extensive research into Head Start programs and was one of the first investigators to link reading success in elementary schools among disadvantaged youth to pre-reading skills they developed in such programs. His research has been funded by the National Institutes of Health and Pew Charitable Trusts, among other prestigious organizations. He is also the recipient of a Microsoft Innovators in Higher Education Award.

Earlier this year, Whitehurst and his wife, Stony Brook colleague Janet Fischel, Associate Professor in the School of Medicine, were awarded a \$1.25 million grant from the U.S. Administration for Children, Youth, and Families to establish a Head Start Quality Research Center at the University. The Center is designed to evaluate the reading skills of pre-school children raised in poverty.

Dialogic Reading, a technique developed by Whitehurst, is widely used by teachers and parents during shared picture-book reading with young children around the world. He has directed projects to enhance emergent literacy and prevent reading difficulties for the National Center for Learning Disabilities and the Public Library Association.

On June 18, the residents and staff at the Long Island State Veterans Home celebrated the 103rd birthday of its oldest resident, retired Brigadier General Sherman Hasbrouck. Born on June 18, 1898,

Hasbrouck is a lifelong resident of New York State. He is a graduate of the West Point Military Academy, and at present, is the oldest living graduate of the Academy. A veteran of both World Wars I and II, Hasbrouck commanded the 97th Combat Division in France, Germany, and Czechoslovakia during World War II. He has received numerous medals, merits, and awards during his distinguished military career. Among them are the Bronze Star, World War I Victory Medal, American Defense Service Medal, and Legion of Merit Award.
