

THE MATT AND DEBRA CODY CENTER

Stony Brook University unveiled its new autism center in Port Jefferson Station last week—just the latest expansion of a wide variety of health services designed to meet the clinical needs of the surrounding community and the region while playing a national leadership role in research.

The 4,000 square-foot Matt and Debra Cody Center for Autism and Developmental Disabilities was made possible through a \$2.5 million contribution from the Codys, who have three autistic children. The gift will be supplemented by additional \$500,000 commitments each from the University and the State University of New York system. The Center is located in the Port Jefferson Professional Park on Route 347 at Davis Avenue.

The Cody Center integrates with departments throughout the University, the School of Medicine, and the Hospital. In addition to conducting research into the causes, diagnosis, early detection, and treatment of autism and developmental disabilities, the center also provides diagnostic and psychiatric evaluation, access to medical and clinical specialists, social skills programs, and community and parent training.

"We thank Matt and Debra Cody for their extraordinary generosity and their extraordinary vision," said Stony Brook President Shirley Strum Kenny. "They are truly special people." She announced that of the \$1.4 million recently raised by the University at its annual gala in New York City, \$600,000 has been designated for the Cody Center.

President Kenny was joined at the event by Norman H. Edelman, M.D., Vice President, Health Sciences Center, and Bruce Schroffel, Director and CEO of Stony Brook University Hospital.

"With the world-class research that we conduct in our nationally renowned medical school, we hope to unlock the clues to the causes of autism," Dr. Edelman said. "The Codys are helping to make this happen."

"Their compassion speaks volumes," Schroffel said. "That is the word that comes to mind when I think of Matt and Debra—compassion."

SBU RESEARCHER ACCEPTS PRESTIGIOUS ESTABLISHED INVESTIGATOR AWARD

Danny Bluestein, an Associate Professor in the Department of Biomedical Engineering, was awarded the prestigious Established Investigator Award (EIA) from the American Heart Association. This is a five-year, \$500,000 award, given once a year.

This award is designed to support projects of excellent scientific merit and the research of mid-term investigators with unusual promise who have demonstrated a commitment to the cardiovascular or cerebrovascular science area as indicated by prior publication history and accomplishments. Dr. Bluestein was honored for his efforts to develop a methodology for quantifying and measuring cardioembolic risk (the risk of blood clots that may cause a stroke) that is induced by implantable cardiovascular devices.

The advent of implantable blood re-circulating devices has provided life-saving solutions to patients with severe cardiovascular diseases and end stage heart disease awaiting transplant or death. Left ventricular assist devices were recently shown to be superior to drug therapy, the implantable total artificial heart is showing promise, and prosthetic heart valves are routinely used for replacing diseased heart valves. However, thromboembolism and the attendant risk of cardioembolic stroke remains an impediment to these devices.

Dr. Bluestein's Project entitled "Hemodynamic Platelet Activation and Thromboembolism in Prosthetic Cardiovascular Devices," aims to develop state-of-the-art numerical, experimental, and in vivo tools that will enable to elucidate flow-induced mechanisms leading to thromboembolism in prosthetic devices. With an accountable model for flow induced thrombogenicity developed and validated, the proposed methodology has the potential to transform current devices design and testing practices, leading to substantial time and cost savings during the research and development phase. It will reduce the risks that patients implanted with these devices face, lower the ensuing healthcare costs, and offer viable long-term solutions for the patients.


CLINICAL ASSISTANT PROFESSOR NAMED FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR

Jane A. Fox, Clinical Assistant Professor in the School of Nursing, has been appointed a Fulbright Scholar - the first one ever in healthcare who will work in El Salvador to develop and train healthcare providers to meet the pediatric healthcare needs of the country. She will apply time between nursing and medical school faculty to develop and train healthcare providers to meet the pediatric healthcare needs of the country.

"I'm looking forward to this challenge," said Fox. "El Salvador is a nation in need of healthcare resources and infrastructure and I greatly appreciate the opportunity being given to me by the Fulbright Scholar program."

The Fulbright Scholar Program is sponsored by the U.S. State Department and offers grants for college and university faculty and others to lecture and conduct research around the world. Fox will spend between six months to a year in El Salvador beginning January, 2004.
