Until then, her time is spent interning with Options for Community Living, Inc., which provides resources for people living with HIV/AIDS on Long Island, and volunteering for Camp H.O.P.E., an organization that focuses on grief counseling. Ardila also works for the New York State Division of Human Rights during the summer.



Ardila is passionate about HIV/AIDS research and is grateful for the chance to work with Options for Community Living Inc. “I’m a huge supporter of [AIDS] research...and having the opportunity to help their community has been a great experience,” says Ardila, adding that, “[Community service] has taught me to be more understanding of other people’s situations.” Ardila divides her time among school, interning, and working as a recreational aide for the Patchogue-Medford School District.
